You must provide your high school's name and teacher's or counselor's information for verification.

To apply, submit a 500-word essay on the **Importance of Local Community History.**

Essays may be submitted via regular mail (postmarked by February 28, 2025) or via e-mail (time stamped before midnight February 28, 2025). The essay must be typed. There is no application form for the scholarship. The essay and your contact information serve as your application. Applicants must include postal mailing address and email contact information on the essay cover sheet.

The winner must send the Quilt Trails of the Tar & Roanoke Rivers confirmation of enrollment to a post-secondary educational institution prior to issuance of the award.
